

This play isn't as good as other Shakespearean comedies. If you want Shakespeare that's funny to *read*, try "Much Ado About Nothing" or "Midsummer's Night Dream". As You Like It probably does better on stage.

Thank you for these wonderful 'translations' of Shakespeare's works. They make all the difference to me, a new student to Shakespeare, at the ripe age of 59 years old....now I can understand and appreciate these amazing works of literature. Much of what he writes makes my hair stand on end. What a genius !

I am leaving a review of this version of the play rather than critiquing the play itself: The side-by-side text is useful. I am an English teacher and bought this version partly to see what my students have "read," as the book features a side-by-side of Shakespeare's original along with the modernized Sparknotes version, which all my students seem to read online. The little footnotes are helpful in adding depth to our understanding of the play, though academic texts add far more footnotes. The thing that bothered me the most is that the original Shakespeare version, where I do all my annotating, is bordered by a very thick black line, which gets in the way of my annotations. Not sure why they put that there. As for the play itself, it's a typical Shakespearean romantic comedy where everyone ends up in the woods, etc. It's among his easier works to understand, so this play (and this version) works well for students.

I've only the modern translation so far, but it was great. As an English major, I always felt that Shakespeare's storytelling skills were overshadowed by his language. It's nice to enjoy just the

story. This play made me laugh out loud many times. Eventually, I will work through the original, but the modern version stands on its own.
